SCHOOL CAPTAINS—Pancake Breakfast







Loarning Focus:

Reading: During reading, students have been learning to think critically about the texts that they read. Thinking critically refers to giving an opinion about the text, E.g., whether you like it or not, and using evidence to support your opinion.

Writing: In writing, students are revisiting recount texts! They did such an amazing job writing their imaginative recounts about The Three Little Pigs (but from one of the character's perspectives). They will now be looking at personal recounts which will help them reflect on 2023 and all the wonderful things they have done and achieved.

Maths: For maths, students are continuing to play number games as part of our mental maths time.

They have also begun learning about number patterns and algebra, which they will learn about for the next few weeks.

We are SunSmart - a note for families

Too much of the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage and skin cancer.

UV damage accumulated during childhood and adolescence is associated with an increased risk of skin cancer later in life. Skin cancer is the most common cancer in Australia. It is also one of the most preventable cancers.

You can't see or feel the sun's UV. Whatever the weather, if the UV levels are three or more, it's important to Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek and Slide!

Sun protection times

Don't just wait for hot and sunny days to use sun protection. Check the sun protection times each day so your family can be protected when they need to be.

Daily local sun protection times and weather details are available from the SunSmart widget on our school website, in the weather section of the newspaper, on the SunSmart website at sunSmart.com.au and as a free SunSmart app. Sun protection times can also be found at the Bureau of Meteorology website and live

SunSmart membership

UV levels are available from ARPANSA.

Our school is a registered member of Cancer Council Victoria's SunSmart Schools Program. We aim to protect children and staff from too much UV.

Sun protection and skin cancer prevention is a shared responsibility. Please help support our SunSmart membership and sun protection efforts by ensuring your child follows the SunSmart measures included in our policy at school and at home.

During the daily local sun protection times (usually from mid-August to the end of April), use these 5 SunSmart steps – even if it's cool and cloudy.

1. SLIP on covering clothing

For free dress days, ensure your child wears clothing that covers as much skin as possible (e.g. elbow length tops with a higher neckline or collar and longer style shorts or skirts). Densely woven fabrics are best.



SLOP on SPF30 (or higher) broadspectrum, water-resistant sunscreen

Apply a generous amount of sunscreen at the start of the day and make sure children have sunscreen in their bag ready to reapply throughout the day. Sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours. Please ensure children get plenty of sunscreen application practice at home so they'll be all set when they are at school. Under supervision, ask children to put a dot of sunscreen on each cheek, nose and chin and rub it in (avoiding the eye area) and sunscreen squiggles or dots on the back of the neck, arms and legs to cover these areas.

3. SLAP on a hat that protects the face, neck and ears

Choose a wide-brimmed, legionnaire or bucket hat. Peak caps and visors do not offer enough UV protection so please leave them at home. Please help your child remember to bring and wear their approved school hat. Please keep this at school so they will always be ready for outdoor activities, outdoor learning and play during school days. For the walk to and from school and weekends, please have an extra home hat to help keep children protected at home.

4. SEEK shade

Choose shady spots for learning and play whenever possible.

SLIDE on wrap-around AS1067 sunglasses When appropriate and practical, help protect the eyes with sunglasses.

WATER SAFETY SESSION (21st November 2023) - CLOTHES REQUIRED

Dear Parents,

The Education Department released a new curriculum for all Victorian schools which included Health and Physical Education as a key learning area. Within this curriculum there is an even greater focus on developing movement skills and concepts required by students to participate in physical activities with competence and confidence.

This term your child has participated in our 'Learn to Swim Program' at Swim and Survival Academy. Throughout the program your child has gained an increased knowledge, understanding and experience necessary to survive in any aquatic environment.

On Tuesday 21st of November students will take part in a number of Water Safety activities. We cover the following areas during the session:-

- Safety rules in and around water
- Safe water entries and exits
- How to wear PFD's
- How to use floating objects to help them get to the edge
- · How to tread and dog paddle clothed
- How to signal for help and assistance
- · What to do if someone is drowning
- How to use objects to save a person from drowning
- · Lifesaving tows (both aided and unaided)
- Identifying and then what to do if you are caught in currents and undertows and what to do
 to survive
- All the lifesaving strokes (for advanced swimmers)

We aim to give all students the best survival skills possible.

As part of this week, students are encouraged to wear a cotton T-shirt and pair of cotton shorts over their bathers and to leave their goggles at home. This way they can experience what it feels like if they accidently fall into water.





What You'll Need:

- Centrelink Customer Reference Numbers (CRNs) for yourself and your child if you would like to claim Child Care Subsidy (CCS). Note that the person completing the enrolment must be the same person linked to the child for CCS
- Bank account details or card for direct debit
- One or more emergency contacts
- Doctor's contact information, management plan for any relevant medical conditions and your child's immunisation record

Steps:

- Scan QR Code above or head to oshclub.com.au/register and click on Get Started to register as a new Kidsoft user
- 2 Validate your registered email address (you will receive an email)
- Create your account password
- A Select your service in 'Find a Place'
- Complete the 'Waitlist' form by adding your child's details (separate one for each child)
- Complete the enrolment form and your local service team will be in touch
