SCHOOL CAPTAINS—Pancake Breakfast





GRADE 5 FISHING KITS

Minister for Outdoor Recreation Sonya Kilkenny has announced 60,000 kits will be made available to grade five primary students in more than 1,900 Victorian schools later this year.

The kits will set families up with everything they need to wet a line including a fishing rod and reel, line, tackle box, some tackle and a *Kids' Guide to Fishing* that includes information and links to educational resources to learn the basics such as fishing safety, knots and rigs.

The kits will help youngsters get active, learn about the aquatic environment and have fun in the great outdoors whether they be down the coast, on Port Phillip Bay or by a river in regional Victoria.

Last week we received our fishing kits, and as you can see, our anglers are excited to throw a line in.







They continue to build their skills to add and subtract numbers and have developed some great skills to measure objects informally to compare their mass.

The junior cohort continues to represent our school brilliantly at swimming and we will certainly miss the gymnastics moving forward.

Term 4: Week 748

Loarning Focus:

Reading: During reading, we are re-visiting summarising.

Students are going over the importance of summarising and what needs to be included when summarising non-fiction texts.

Writing: In writing, students are learning about text/film reviews (response to literature). They are learning how to critique and analyse a text/film by discussing what happened in the text/film (summary) and discussing what they like and dislike about it (opinion).

Maths: For number, students are continuing to work on patterns and algebra. We have learnt that all number patterns have a particular rule that they must follow. These rules could use different operations such as addition subtraction, multiplication and division.

In Measurement, we have finished learning about mass and are beginning to learn about geometry, and location and transformation.



The students have been learning and playing number games such as 'BUMP' and 'Smash It' during maths time!

What's Happening?

I would like to celebrate the wonderful learning that the Grade 2/3/4's have been doing over the past couple of weeks. Students have been busy completing assessments for reading, writing and maths, and the results so far have been impressive!

In week 6, students completed a personal recount for their Cold Write. I really enjoyed reading these pieces of writing and seeing all the progress the students have made since the start of the year. Keep it up everyone!







We are SunSmart - a note for families

Too much of the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage and skin cancer.

UV damage accumulated during childhood and adolescence is associated with an increased risk of skin cancer later in life. Skin cancer is the most common cancer in Australia. It is also one of the most preventable cancers.

You can't see or feel the sun's UV. Whatever the weather, if the UV levels are three or more, it's important to Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek and Slide!

Sun protection times

Don't just wait for hot and sunny days to use sun protection. Check the sun protection times each day so your family can be protected when they need to be.

Daily local sun protection times and weather details are available from the SunSmart widget on our school website, in the weather section of the newspaper, on the SunSmart website at sunSmart.com.au and as a free SunSmart app. Sun protection times can also be found at the Bureau of Meteorology website and live

SunSmart membership

UV levels are available from ARPANSA.

Our school is a registered member of Cancer Council Victoria's SunSmart Schools Program. We aim to protect children and staff from too much UV.

Sun protection and skin cancer prevention is a shared responsibility. Please help support our SunSmart membership and sun protection efforts by ensuring your child follows the SunSmart measures included in our policy at school and at home.

During the daily local sun protection times (usually from mid-August to the end of April), use these 5 SunSmart steps – even if it's cool and cloudy.

1. SLIP on covering clothing

For free dress days, ensure your child wears clothing that covers as much skin as possible (e.g. elbow length tops with a higher neckline or collar and longer style shorts or skirts). Densely woven fabrics are best.



SLOP on SPF30 (or higher) broadspectrum, water-resistant sunscreen

Apply a generous amount of sunscreen at the start of the day and make sure children have sunscreen in their bag ready to reapply throughout the day. Sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours. Please ensure children get plenty of sunscreen application practice at home so they'll be all set when they are at school. Under supervision, ask children to put a dot of sunscreen on each cheek, nose and chin and rub it in (avoiding the eye area) and sunscreen squiggles or dots on the back of the neck, arms and legs to cover these areas.

3. SLAP on a hat that protects the face, neck and ears

Choose a wide-brimmed, legionnaire or bucket hat. Peak caps and visors do not offer enough UV protection so please leave them at home. Please help your child remember to bring and wear their approved school hat. Please keep this at school so they will always be ready for outdoor activities, outdoor learning and play during school days. For the walk to and from school and weekends, please have an extra home hat to help keep children protected at home.

4. SEEK shade

Choose shady spots for learning and play whenever possible.

SLIDE on wrap-around AS1067 sunglasses When appropriate and practical, help protect the eyes with sunglasses.



How to enrol



What You'll Need:

- Centrelink Customer Reference Numbers (CRNs) for yourself and your child if you would like to claim Child Care Subsidy (CCS). Note that the person completing the enrolment must be the same person linked to the child for CCS
- Bank account details or card for direct debit
- One or more emergency contacts
- Doctor's contact information, management plan for any relevant medical conditions and your child's immunisation record

Steps:

- Scan QR Code above or head to oshclub.com.au/register and click on Get Started to register as a new Kidsoft user
- 2 Validate your registered email address (you will receive an email)
- Create your account password
- A Select your service in 'Find a Place'
- Complete the 'Waitlist' form by adding your child's details (separate one for each child)
- Complete the enrolment form and your local service team will be in touch
